## Tense use in academic writing ... a beginner's guide


This is a summary of the tenses most commonly used in academic writing.


Purpose	Tense	Example
To report information or concepts that are accepted in your field as a 'fact' or 'true'	Present	In the New Zealand MMP system, the proportion of seats in parliament <u>is</u> based on the proportion of votes each political party receives in the election.  Kingfishers <u>are</u> found throughout the mainland of New Zealand and some offshore islands. [ECOL103 assignment]  Leisure, recreation, play, tourism and sport <u>are</u> all terms that are familiar to most people. [RECN101 assignment]
To report historical facts	Past	The first referendum on the New Zealand electoral system <u>was</u> held in 1992, and the binding referendum <u>took</u> place the following year.
To make general statements about previous research, or summarise previous research from several sources	Present perfect	Societies' consumeristic desires


